Capt. Herb Schulz

apt. Herb Schulz doesn't need to tell fish stories. During his 50 years at the helm of charter fishing boats using the Boynton Beach Inlet, he's witnessed real-life dramas that would sink any fish story.

There were those unforgettable times over the years when the late Col. Robert McCormick, then publisher of the Chicago Tribune, boarded Schulz's boat

wearing white gloves.

"Mr. McCormick was the only person who ever wore white gloves on my boat," Schulz said.
"He wore the gloves every time and never took them off. His chauffeur always reeled the fish in for him."

Schulz, who once helped comedian Jonathan Winters catch "a big one," is longer on people stories than on fish stories.

The genial man with the warm smile grew up in Boynton Beach. A fishing addict since he was seven, Schulz skippered his first charter boat in 1939, when he was 16.

Schulz, 66, who served as a Navy boatswain overseas for 31/2 years during World War II, has rescued dozens of people at sea during his 50 years as a charter captain.

Some were rescues off the Boynton Inlet were during World II, after German submarines tor-

poed U.S. ships.


